**Front cover:** Adult male Eastern Vervet *Chlorocebus pygerythrus centralis* (Neumann, 1900), north of Mahale Mountains National Park, Uvinza District, central western Tanzania. Widely recognized by the taxonomic authorities of the primates of Africa for 100 years as a valid subspecies, *centralis*, but considered a synonym of either Reddish-Green Vervet *C. p. rufoviridis* (I. Geoffroy, 1843) or Southern Vervet *C. p. pygerythrus* (F. Cuvier, 1821) since the end of the 20th century. *Chlorocebus p. centralis* has recently been resurrected due to a better understanding of the geographic distribution of the subspecies of *Chlorocebus* in East Africa and the resolution of some of the confusion related to the geographic distribution of Hilgert's Grivet *Chlorocebus aethiops hilgerti* (Neumann, 1902). # Instructions to Contributors

## Articles submitted to *Primate Conservation*

### *Manuscript Format*

All manuscripts should be type written, double spaced, with generous margins, and submitted electronically as a Word document or in Rich Text Format (rtf). Please indicate on a separate cover page the corresponding author, address, and e-mail, the date of submission, up to six key words, and a short running title. Please provide an abstract of 300–500 words. Footnotes are to be avoided (except in tables and figures). IMRAD subtitles can be used but are not obligatory. Please give all measurements in metric units. Please take special care concerning diacritical marks of languages other than English. Bibliographic references should be in the following style:

Example – journal article:

Maps should always be made as concise as possible and should include an inset showing the location of the area discussed in relation to its home country or continent.

### *Figures - maps, graphs, illustrations and photographs*

We accept high-resolution images in color or black-and-white in EPS, TIF, or JPG formats (300 dpi at the size which you would like to have them printed). All maps, graphs, illustrations, and photographs should be submitted in a file or files separately from the main text. Please list the captions/legends at the end of the main text or in a separate Word document. In the case of photographs, please provide the name of the photographer. We encourage high quality photographs of the species that are the object of the manuscript.
